Requirements:

Students are required to fulfill the **reading** commitments from class to class and to participate in **class-discussions**, and possible out-of-class activities.

Description of the course:

This course is designed specifically for incoming ERASMUS and international students. It offers an overview on 20th Century Hungarian literature and culture: Budapest culture at the *fin-de-siecle*, and interwar literature, music and the fine arts, and literature and film under Communism. Works of art are discussed in historical, political, intellectual and social context.

Compulsory readings:

Poems by Endre Ady, Attila József, János Pilinszky, and György Petri. Novels by Dezső Kosztolányi, Antal Szerb, Sándor Márai, Imre Kertész, and Péter Nádas. Films by Zoltán Huszárik and Péter Gothár will be projected and discussed in class.
